The Australian UN Women's theme for International Women's Day 2014 is Ending Poverty for Women and Girls through Economic Empowerment.

On 4 March the Hon Julie Bishop MP, Minister for Foreign Affairs and Senator the Hon Michaelia Cash, Minister Assisting the Prime Minister for Women, put out a joint media release advising that "the Australian Government is marking International Women's Day with a focus on our efforts and progress towards gender equality for women and girls around the world."

This is why around half of Australia's aid budget is spent on initiatives, policies and programs that have at their heart a significant focus on gender equality and the empowerment of women and girls."
